# CFT Legislative Report

The first year of the legislation session ended when the California State Legislature adjourned in the early hours of September 12, 2007. Immediately prior to that adjournment, both houses of the legislature announced a special session focusing on water and health issues, to begin upon adjournment of the regular session.

The Governor acted on all bills by October 14, 2007. In addition to the special session issues, the Legislature may conduct hearings during the interim before it reconvenes January 7, 2008. However, no action on regular session bills can be taken.

CFT analyzed and took position on 163 bills. When the session ended September 11, a total of 52 bills tracked by the CFT reached the Governor. We supported 30 and opposed 3. Additionally, CFT had a Watch position on 19 bills. The Watch usually means that we opposed a given bill, worked with the author and the legislators to remove our objections and then determined that, while we could not enthusiastically support the bill, its passage into law would do no harm to our members.

### AB 139 – Chapter 158, Statutes of 2007

Author:	Bass, Karen (D)
Position:	Support
Summary:	Authorizes a licensed advanced practice registered nurse qualified to perform a medical exam or a licensed physician assistant to provide a medical exam to school bus drivers who are applying for or renewing a certificate to drive. (Current law permits school bus drivers to undergo exams only by a licensed physician for this purpose.)

### AB 194 – Chapter 489, Statutes of 2007

Author:	Committee on Budget, (A)
Position:	Watch
Summary:	Makes necessary and agreed to changes and modifications to the budget bills (SB 77 and SB 78) to reinstate various funds line-item vetoed by the governor. Includes \$5 million in funding to the state pre-school budget item (with clarifying language), and \$33.1 million in the community college budget for Basic Skills courses (modifies funding allocation by taking into account the number of full-time equivalent students generated in basic skills by students transitioning from high schools). Adds budget bill language requiring a report to the Legislature on annual accountability measures.

Summary:	Requires that nonpublic, nonsectarian institutions serving special needs students use instructional materials that are adopted by the State Board of Education.

Summary:	Prohibits STRS and PERS from investing public employee retirement funds in a company with business operations in Iran. Also, the bill requires the Systems to sell or transfer any such investments, until sanctions have been revoked against Iran.

Summary:	Regulates credit card marketing in all three segments of California's public university system.

Summary:	Increases the aggregate limit of temporary disability benefits from 104 weeks to 156 weeks for an injury occurring on or after January 1, 2008.

Summary:	Changes the technical requirements for a teaching credential and requires application processing within 50 days.

Summary:	Allows all public employers in California to contract with PERS to invest monies that are set aside by these employers to prefund the future cost of their retiree health benefits and other post-employment benefits.

Summary:	Makes a number of technical changes to the laws governing STRS.

Summary:	Provides immunity for charter schools when accidents occur during a field trip.
<b>AB 1194 - Chapter 21, Statutes of 2007</b>

Summary:	Specifies that employees have the right to represent themselves in employment relations with the public school employer until an exclusive representative is chosen.
<b>AB 1316 - Chapter 332, Statutes of 2007</b>

Summary:	Allows members of the STRS Defined Benefit Program who apply for disability to receive a service retirement allowance during the determination of eligibility period.

Summary:	Requires the Chancellor’s Office of the California Community Colleges, in consultation with the Governor’s Office of Emergency Services and the Office of Homeland Security, to develop emergency preparedness standards and guidelines to assist community college districts and campuses in the event of a natural disaster, hazardous condition, or terrorist activity on or around campuses.

Summary:	Requires discussion of and action by the Regents of the University of California about executive compensation to occur in open, public meetings.

Summary:	Requires, among other things, that paraprofessionals participating in the California School Paraprofessional Teacher Training Program receive a certificate of clearance from the Commission on Teacher Credentialing prior to participating in the program.

Summary:	Allows districts to issue district intern credentials to employees providing instruction to students with mild and moderate disabilities. Current law sunsetted this provision in 2008.

Summary:	Requires revision of the Academic Performance Index to include drop out data and the scores of students referred to an alternative education program. Also establishes an advisory committee to consider multiple measures of school success.

Position:	Support
Summary:	Urges the Regents of the University of California to provide joint governance for the University of California Retirement Plan by including an equal number of trustees representing the University and the faculty and staff plan participants.

Summary:	Establishes the California Cooperative Health Insurance Purchasing Program to enable workers and others to have health insurance.

Summary:	Provides that marriage is a personal relationship arising out of a civil contract between two persons.
<b>AB 72</b>

Position:	Watch
Summary:	Requires Grade 7-12 social science instruction to include instruction on the role of Filipinos in World War II.
<b>AB 144</b>

Position:	Watch
Summary:	Authorizes the Franklin-McKinley School District to offer the mathematics portion of the exit exam to 8th grade students once yearly at the same time it is offered to 10th graders. If a student passes the exam in 8th grade, the student will be deemed to have passed the exam for purposes of graduation from high school.

Summary:	Extends the incentive grant program for home economics and career technical programs.

Author:	Brownley, Julia (D)
Position:	Co-Sponsor
Summary:	Requires the Superintendent of Public Instruction to identify additional criteria and measures by which high school students unable to pass the High School Exit Exam may receive a high school diploma.
<b>SB 123</b>	
Author:	Romero, Gloria (D)
Position:	Support
Summary:	Allows students with disabilities to receive a high school diploma by either passing the exit exam with approved modifications or accommodations or completing a standardized evidence-based assessment.
<b>SB 284</b>	
Author:	Lowenthal, Alan (D)
Position:	Neutral
Summary:	Prohibits a person from representing him/herself as a certified athletic trainer unless he/she is registered as one by a specified athletic training organization.
<b>SB 727</b>	
Author:	Kuehl, Sheila (D)
Position:	Support
Summary:	Expands the scope of the family temporary disability program to include grandparents, grandchildren, parents-in-law, and siblings within the definition of "family member," and makes conforming and clarifying changes in provisions relating to family temporary disability compensation.

Summary:	Addresses the increasing cost of college texts by requiring transparency in college textbook prices by prohibiting a public postsecondary education institution from buying, selling or allowing the sale on its campus of a textbook unless and until the publisher of that textbook posts information about edition changes, bundling of additional materials, any inducements to faculty to use a particular text, and other information specified in the bill.

Also, the bill makes it a crime for a person to accept a pension payment with the knowledge that he/she is not entitled to the benefits.

Summary:	Revises the Nell Soto Parent/Teacher Involvement Program to expand the school site staff to among other personnel, classified staff, eligible to participate in the home visits and community meetings.
<b>AB 68</b>

Position:	Co-Sponsor
Summary:	Establishes the Pupil Services Block Grant for the purpose of hiring or expanding services provided by, among other personnel, counselors, nurses, and social workers. The bill also allows funds to be used to reduce class sizes in special education classes.

<b>AB 127</b>	
Author:	Beall, Jim (D)
Position:	Watch
Summary:	Requires the Superintendent of Public Instruction to develop a method for distributing resources to schools based on the specific needs of the students and would allow funding to follow the student who moves within a school district.

<b>AB 131</b>	
Author:	Beall, Jim (D)
Position:	Support
Summary:	Extends the availability of the Supplemental School Counseling Program to county offices of education. (Currently the program is available to middle and high schools.)
<b>AB 137</b>	
Author:	DeVore, Chuck (R)
Position:	Oppose
Summary:	Provides that a K-12 school employee or classified community college employee who is a knowing member or financial supporter of an extremist terror network may be dismissed from his/her employment. Also, the bill prohibits a teacher from teaching untruths about extremist terror networks.

Summary:	Breaks up the Los Angeles Unified School District into districts of no more than 50,000 students.

# Glossary of Legislative Terms

CAUCUS	Each legislator belongs to either the Republican or Democratic Caucus in his/her house of the Legislature. In addition to party caucuses, legislators may belong to other caucuses, such as the Latino Caucus, the Women's Caucus, or a regional Caucus. Caucuses may sponsor bills or take positions (often on a package of bills) on a particular issue such as child care.
CHAPTER	A bill that becomes law is given a chapter number and may be located by that number in the appropriate Code (Penal, Election, Education, etc.). Each legislative year the Chapter numbering begins with the number 1 and continues in numerical order, so all Chapters are followed by the year that the law was enacted (i.e., Chapter 75, Statutes of 1995).
CHECKLIST	The process by which a budget subcommittee approves a budget item on a policy basis, but withholds action on funding the item until revenue figures are known, usually after the May Revision to the Budget.
COMMITTEE ACTIONS	Each committee - policy or fiscal - may take one or more of several actions; take no action, pass the original or amended form of the bill, kill it by vote, hold it in committee, refer it to another committee, or send it to interim study.
CONFERENCE COMMITTEE	If a bill is amended in the second house, it goes back to the first house for concurrence in the amendments. If the first house concurs, it is sent to the Governor. If the house disagrees, the bill will be sent to a conference committee, composed of three members from each house. If both houses adopt the conference committee's report, the bill will go to the Governor.
FISCAL COMMITTEE	Each bill that contains an appropriation, or has implications for the use of State funds, is sent to the fiscal committees: Assembly Appropriations Committee and Senate Appropriations Committee. Sub-committees of the Budget Committee make recommendations to the full committee on the State Budget. The Senate and the Assembly Budget Committees may also review individual bills.
FLOOR VOTE	Roll call after a bill has been read three times and debated on the floor of a house. An ordinary bill needs a majority vote to pass (21 in the Senate, 41 in the Assembly). A bill with an urgency clause, or one with fiscal implications, requires a two-thirds votes (27 in the Senate, 54 in the Assembly).
GOVERNOR'S DESK	The Governor has 12 days (30 days at the end of each year of a two-year legislative session) after receiving a bill, to sign it into law, allow it to become law without his signature, or veto it. In bills that include appropriations, the Governor may veto or reduce the expenditures while approving the other provisions. This act is called a line item veto.

INTERIM STUDY	Recommendation by a committee that the subject matter of a bill be the subject of special hearings in the interim between sessions of the Legislature. This action kills the bill for that year.
LEGISLATIVE ANALYST	Fiscal advisor to the Legislature on each item in the proposed State Budget and on all bills before the fiscal committees. This office also analyzes the fiscal impact of ballot propositions.
LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL	Chief legal advisor to the Legislature. This office drafts bills, summarizes each bill, advises legislators on the constitutionality and legality of proposed legislation, and prepares digests and indexes of codes and statutes.
POLICY COMMITTEE	Standing committees of each house that take testimony and action on bills. Each bill is assigned to a policy committee appropriate to the subject matter.
RE-CONSIDERATION	Bills which fail in committee or on the floor may be considered an additional time if reconsideration is granted. If a bill fails reconsideration vote, it is normally considered to be dead.
VETO	The Governor's action to prevent the enactment of a bill.
VETO OVERRIDE	A two-thirds vote of each house is required to override the Governor's veto.

## Handy Facts

LEGISLATURE	The two houses (Assembly and Senate) that make laws for the State.
ASSEMBLY	Lower house composed of 80 members, who serve for two-year terms. Each member may serve a maximum of three terms.
SENATE	Upper house composed of 40 members, who serve four-year terms. Each member may serve a maximum of two terms.
BILLS	Bills authored by Assembly Members are designated AB (Assembly Bills). AB/SB Bills authored by Senators are designated SB (Senate Bills). Bills are numbered consecutively by the order in which they are introduced during a given two-year session.
ACA/SCA	Constitutional amendments which will be put on the ballot at the next election, if passed by the Legislature.
ACR/SCR	Concurrent resolutions are used to adopt joint rules of the Legislature, commend people, or express legislative intent.
