Triple Title I funding

Use Title I funding to ensure that districts offer educators competitive salaries

Create community schools and expand these services for 300,000 students and their families

Provide debt-free community college for two years, or other high-quality training programs

Double maximum value of Pell Grants

Improve the Public Service Loan Forgiveness program to offer \$10,000 of student debt relief for every year of national or community service, up to five years

Provide universal pre-K for 3- and 4-year-olds

Provide funding to ensure early childhood education workforce is lifted out of poverty

Ban for-profit charters and increase accountability and transparency for current charters

The Bloomberg campaign has not released its education plan as of this printing. The campaign has indicated, however, that the expansion of charter schools will be included in its education plan once released.

As mayor of New York City, Mike Bloomberg had a complicated and often cantankerous relationship with our membership. While the United Federation of Teachers (AFT Local #2) was able to secure resources for our classrooms and children, and contracts that provided pay increases for educators, the mayor chose a school chancellor who disrespected—rather than supported—the city's teachers and fixated on high-stakes tests, top-down dictates and charter schools, instead of focusing on students and their needs, including fixing, not closing, neighborhood schools.

Triple Title I funding

Eliminate wage gap for teachers in Title I schools

Increase federal support for community schools

Provide automatic income-driven repayment plan, and allow debt cancellation through Public Service Loan Forgiveness and Teacher Loan Forgiveness programs

Provide tuition-free public college for families earning up to \$100,000 per year and subsidies for those making up to \$150,000

Increase funding and size of maximum Pell Grant award

Invest \$700 billion in universal free or affordable full-day early learning through age 5

Strengthen Head Start and after-school programs

Raise wages for early childhood educators

Ban for-profit charters and increase accountability and transparency for current charters

Triple Title I funding

Ensure a minimum salary for teachers of \$60,000 per year

Provide \$5 billion per year for community schools

Eliminate tuition and fees at four-year public colleges, tribal colleges, community colleges, trade schools and apprenticeship programs

Cancel all student debt and establish interest-rate cap for future loans

Increase size of maximum Pell Grant award

Guarantee universal, high-quality child care, regardless of income, from infancy through age 3.

Provide universal pre-K education, regardless of income, starting at age 3.

Double the number of early childhood educators, and guarantee a fair and living wage for everyone working in early education.

Ban for-profit charters and increase accountability and transparency for current charters

End federal funding for new charters

Provide a 2-to-1 federal match for every new dollar states and districts spend on raising teacher pay

Invest in a network of 25,000 community schools by 2025

Provide free two-year public college and debtfree four-year college for low- and middle-income students

Allow students to refinance loans at lower rates

Expand Public Service Loan Forgiveness program

Provide free universal pre-K for 3- and 4-year-olds

Provide funding to ensure early childhood teachers are compensated like their K-12 counterparts Ban for-profit charter schools and increase accountability and transparency for current charters

Freeze federal funding for new nonprofit charter schools

Quadruple Title I funding and increase Individuals with Disabilities Education Act funding by \$20 billion per year

Raise teacher pay through increasing Title I funding

Establish 25,000 community schools by 2030

Provide free two- or fouryear public college

Invest additional \$100 billion in Pell Grants

Cancel up to \$50,000 in student debt for borrowers with an annual household income of less than \$100,000, with graduated debt relief for those making up to \$250,000 Establish universal child care and early learning for 12 million children, which would be free for low-income families and affordable for others

Support and fairly compensate pre-K teachers

Expand IDEA funding for 3- to 5-year-olds and early intervention services for toddlers and infants Ban for-profit charters and increase accountability and transparency for current charters

End federal funding for new charters
